Juror Paul Reuther selected 124 artists from 474 entries for the exhibition. He studied painting at



It all began with a college drawing and painting class in New Jersey and with her father's art connection for his sign painting and lettering business. Blaker and her father both belonged to the Gloucester County Art League in New Jersey.

"There were always art supplies and 'how-to-draw' books around our house, and he encouraged my sisters and me to experiment with them.

Blaker is a dedicated watercolorist who likes to travel and paint especially in warm locales —anywhere with palm trees. This includes Key West and Costa Rica, of course, and now she's off to Mexico in February.

Her recent exhibition of works at *The Kitchen* at Paynters Mill shows her love for Key West. According to Blaker, in Key West, the flowers, chickens, and locals are colorful and there are street scenes begging to be

painted. She is currently a member of the Rehoboth Art League, Cape Artists, and the Art League of Ocean City.

^{*}V-mail, or Victory mail, was a type of mail used during WWII in America as the primary and secure method to correspond with soldiers stationed abroad. It used a combination of electronic and physical delivery. Letters were microfilmed and the microfilm was then sent in place of the letter, saving valuable space and still getting letters to our troops and home to soldiers' families. The letters were printed on the receiving end at a distrubtion print center and then delivered. V-Mail was sent and received from June 1942 through November 1945.

Tip of the Month - Masking

So you want to save some of the whites of the paper in your painting? Do you mask? The answer is—whatever works for you. There are



many products available to help you decide and they are known as frisket, masking fluid, or drawing gum.

In any case, it's good to first *experiment* with masking. Sometimes it can be hard to remove. This usually happens

when the masking goes into the paint itself. This could be from old masking fluid, for letting it dry in too warm a space, or for leaving it on the paper too long.

Masking fluid is available colorless and tinted. The colored, or tinted, fluid makes it easier to see where it has been applied, but some artists may find the colored fluid distracting or cause them to alter the color of their paints. Some painters have even been known to leave a tint of the color on the paper when the mask has been removed.

One of the easiest types of masking to use is PEBEO drawing gum. It dilutes and cleans with water. With PEBEO you can draw very fine lines, using a fine steel nib. Before you begin, gently swirl the bottle or tilt end over end once or twice. Never shake the bottle because that creates bubbles that make a strange mottled effect on the paper, unless, of course, that's your intention.

You can also drop three or four BB shots into the bottle. These can be swirled around the inside the bottle causing the fluid to mix gently just like the beads found in good nail polish. If you find that there is a buildup of coagulated masking fluid usually in the bottom of the jar, you can remove it by using a wooden skewer and sweeping it around the bottom. The skewer will collect all the solidified stuff, and the remainder of the fluid will be safe to use. *Hint:* Storing masking fluid in the refrigerator prolongs its shelf life.

To begin, use an old brush. Many artists first wash the brush with soap and then wipe without rinsing before applying the drawing gum. However, if you haven't tried Cheap Joe's Uggly brushes, you may want to. Renown watercolor artist Linda Baker swears by these and doesn't find it necessary to apply any soap first, but only soaps brushes to clean them when finished masking. Uggly brushes are a little heavier or stiffer than the typical watercolor brush. They come in round sizes 2, 4, 6, and 8; flat sizes 4 and 8 and are inexpensive.

Usually the drawing gum is applied to dry paper, but you can *experiment* with dampening the paper first and then applying the frisket. This wet method can help avoid those hard lines that you see when you remove the frisket. Make sure the frisket is well dried before you begin painting over it. Wait 20 minutes, no hair drier. Don't let the gum dry in direct sunlight, as it will adhere to and pull up the paper.

Make sure your paper is dry before removing the masking with a crepe eraser. You should remove the masking fluid within a week, so plan ahead and know where you are going with your painting before you begin.
