In the Spotlight

Tsabel Pizzolato, DWS vice-president and resident of Milton, DE has been doing art for years. It all began at the age of three, when a friend of her father painted her portrait. She's been fascinated with the magic of paint to surface ever since.

Heavy Lifting by Isabel Pizzolato

"Watching the colors take form is something that always entrances me and I never get tired of," says Pizzolato.

During her working career as a banker, art always took a backseat, although she would occasionally take a class or view her art books. Retirement has allowed Pizzolato to dedicate the time and focus on developing her painting skills. To that end, she was fortunate to have seen an advertisement in the local paper for watercolor lessons, no experience required.

Pizzolato credits much of her success to the techniques she learned from Elizabeth Collard's class in the basics of watercolor. "She always challenged me to do more. It worked. My first entry, ever, in a DWS juried show earned the "Best in Show" award. I smiled for a week," notes Pizzolato.

Since then, Pizzolato continues to look for images that catch her eye---a row of mailboxes, boats in a

harbor, the way light filters through colored glass. Sometimes this works, sometimes it doesn't. She points out, "I have a lot of scrap paper!" Even her husband Mike wonders, "Why is she taking that picture?" But he's finally learned to trust her judgment and now asks what caught her attention.

Pizzolato knows not to discount any subject because even something with little appeal can be a challenge and result in a work of art she's proud of. In sum, she adds, "As I continue my journey, I enjoy taking workshops, being involved with DWS and other local organizations, and in exploring the wonderful world of art."

Tip of the Month - Glazing

Glazing is the laying down of layers of watercolor washes one at a time on top of the previous wash. In wet glazing, the layers are placed while the already applied washes are wet. In this wet-inwet technique, the colors blend on the page, without further brushing, an approach frequently used in creating colorful backgrounds. In dry glazing, each layer of color is applied atop the previously dried wash. There's no limit to the number of glazes you can apply to achieve your desired results.

Use transparent pigments to build and create rich colors that allow you to see through the washes, such as Quinacridone Gold, and Opera. Avoid pigments that settle and creature textures such as French Ultramarine Blue, Cerulean, Cobalt and opaques such as cadmium colors, Yellow Ochre, Naples Yellow, and so on. Experiment with your color palette and make a transparent watercolor chart to determine what will work for you.
