January 12, 2016 - Creating Positive Shapes

Want to expand your imagination through negative painting? Do you know how to create a positive image this way?

Join in the fun and the freedom of painting abstractly using three analogous colors. Beth Collard will walk us through the steps to create a painting by sculpting out background colors to reveal an entirely new positive image.

Bring your paints and quarter sheets of watercolor paper. You'll need to secure your paper to a support board with tape or staples. Make sure you

have a one-inch or larger flat brush, a #14 or larger round brush, sea salt, table salt, and saran wrap, and any other items you might use for interesting texture in your underpainting.

February 9 – Open Critique

Here's your chance to critique your work with input from others. We should all be able to recognize the best and worst of our paintings and what little fixes we need to make to be happy with our work.

Bring two or more paintings, finished or in progress, that you think can be improved upon, and we will discuss and provide positive feedback and guidance on as many as we can get through.

This process will give you new insights into your own work and you'll also get to see what other artists are doing.

Owen enjoys painting flowers and landscapes and loves to spend time in Kauai where she is surrounded by gorgeous flowers, rainbows, mountains, the ocean, and wildlife. Other favorite painting spots are Giverny and Provence. Her favorite recent workshop instructor is English painter, Roger Dellar, who has a local following. "I've learned so much from his workshops," says Owen.

A member of the Millsboro and Rehoboth Art Leagues, Owen studied nursing at Washington College in St. Louis and worked as a night supervisor at a large hospital in the District of Columbia. She has three grown children and three grands. In addition to her art, she loves to play bridge, garden, and bake.
