"Creative Backgrounds" a three-day watercolor Zoom workshop with artist Robin Poteet, January 30, 31, and February 2, 2023.

This workshop will focus on creative backgrounds for any subject. To quote Robin "We have all done it. We've painted a great

subject and have avoided the background until the last minute. Now What? We end up painting a washy, safe, background that does little to enhance the subject. NO MORE! In this workshop students will learn how to combine realism and abstraction to take their work to the next level." Join Robin and other artists and "jazz up your backgrounds."

Day One – Introduction, demonstration and group exercises.

Day Two – Demonstration followed by participants working on their own, with instruction, if needed.

Day Three – Demonstration followed by participants working on their own, with instruction. Sharing and wrap-up during the final hour.

# A Lesson on Framing

Artist, Nick Serratore provided some helpful insight regarding correct framing practices. Proper framing enhances your artwork and is worth the investment to do it properly. At our most recent show at the Rehoboth Art League, there were some framing issues that were problematic. These issues may cause your accepted work to be rejected for hanging in an exhibit by the organization hosting the show or the judge.

Stop in at Peninsula Gallery in Lewes to view Nick's work. While there, pay special attention to how the work on display is framed.

- Clean mats are key. Poorly cut and dirty mats, dust, hair, and smudges are a turnoff to the judge and potential buyers. To quote Nick "seeing dirt, hair or smudges is like finding hair in your soup."
- Your work should be the focus and draw the attention of potential buyers. The frame should not distract from this goal. Avoid antique looks, heavy frames, thick black frame and brown frames which may detract from your image.

- To save money, plan your paintings to fit into standard size frames. This also works well for shrink wrap packaging.
- Keep mats neutral, off-white or pale grey. Double mats are a plus.
- Avoid bulky frames. Aim for 1" thick with a 2 ½" to 3" mat.
- Chose a frame that complements your work and suits all your framing needs. Select a new frame every few years as trends change. A frame that is simple and neutral will fit in anyone's home.
- Many galleries do not accept metal frames.
- Avoid plexiglass unless you will be shipping your work.
- Include information on the back of your work.
- The back of your work should be as presentable as the front of your work. Clean, unmarred dust covers and proper wiring are a must.

Most importantly, your presentation represents you and the image you wish to portray.
