In August, we'll have another mini-workshop on Japanese fish printing, a form of nature printing dating back to the 1800's, using Sumi ink and Washi paper. Today it has developed into an art form. Once printed, the details of the fish are finished using colored inks, watercolors, acrylics, gouache, or pencils. Your choice. No dead fish, though. We'll likely use molds. This is just for fun and to try something different.

In the Spotlight

Nancy Mysak was born and raised on the Eastern Shore of Maryland and remembers painting, drawing and building things from wood scraps as a young child. She began art lessons at the age of seven and has been painting and drawing ever since. She attended Virginia Commonwealth University's school of Painting and Printmaking. Later, she transferred to Salisbury University where she graduated with a major in Elementary Education and a minor in art. She taught elementary and middle school children until her own two daughters were in college and has painted full-time since then.

While teaching, Mysak continued to paint and show her work, and along with eleven other artists formed a co-op dedicated to producing at least one yearly show in the Salisbury area for twenty years. Nancy has done workshops with many teachers over the years, including Jean Grastorf, John Salminen, Betsy Dillard Stroud, Charles Reid, Janet Rodgers and Susan Avis Murphy. She is a signature member of the Delaware Watercolor Society and the Baltimore Watercolor Society and has shown her work in many local and regional galleries.

Mysak has tried printmaking, has worked in oils for years and still uses acrylics at times, but says that when she found watercolor, she fell in love. And she believes painting is the best way for her to express her feelings. Whether it is the beauty of an old boat tied at a pier, a cat sitting in the sun, or some rowdy chickens in a barnyard, she likes the challenge of watercolor as a way to to capture the emotion and impression of a scene.

She also enjoys travelling and painting including trips to areas on the west coast and the northeast in the U.S. as well as France and Italy, but she knows that we don't have to go far from home to find interesting subjects.
